Brief description of the care home
<p>The Orchard is registered to provide personal care and accommodation for up to five younger adults with a learning disability. It is owned and operated by Humberside Independent Care Association Ltd (HICA) which is a not for profit organisation. The home is situated in the village of Keyingham; the location provides service users with easy access to a variety of local shops, public houses and public transport. The standard fees charged by the home were 503.77 pounds per week with additional charges made for hairdressing, chiropody, toiletries etc. This information was provided by the registered person as part of the inspection process in March 2008. The Orchard provides information about the home to prospective residents in its Statement of Purpose and Service User Guide.</p>

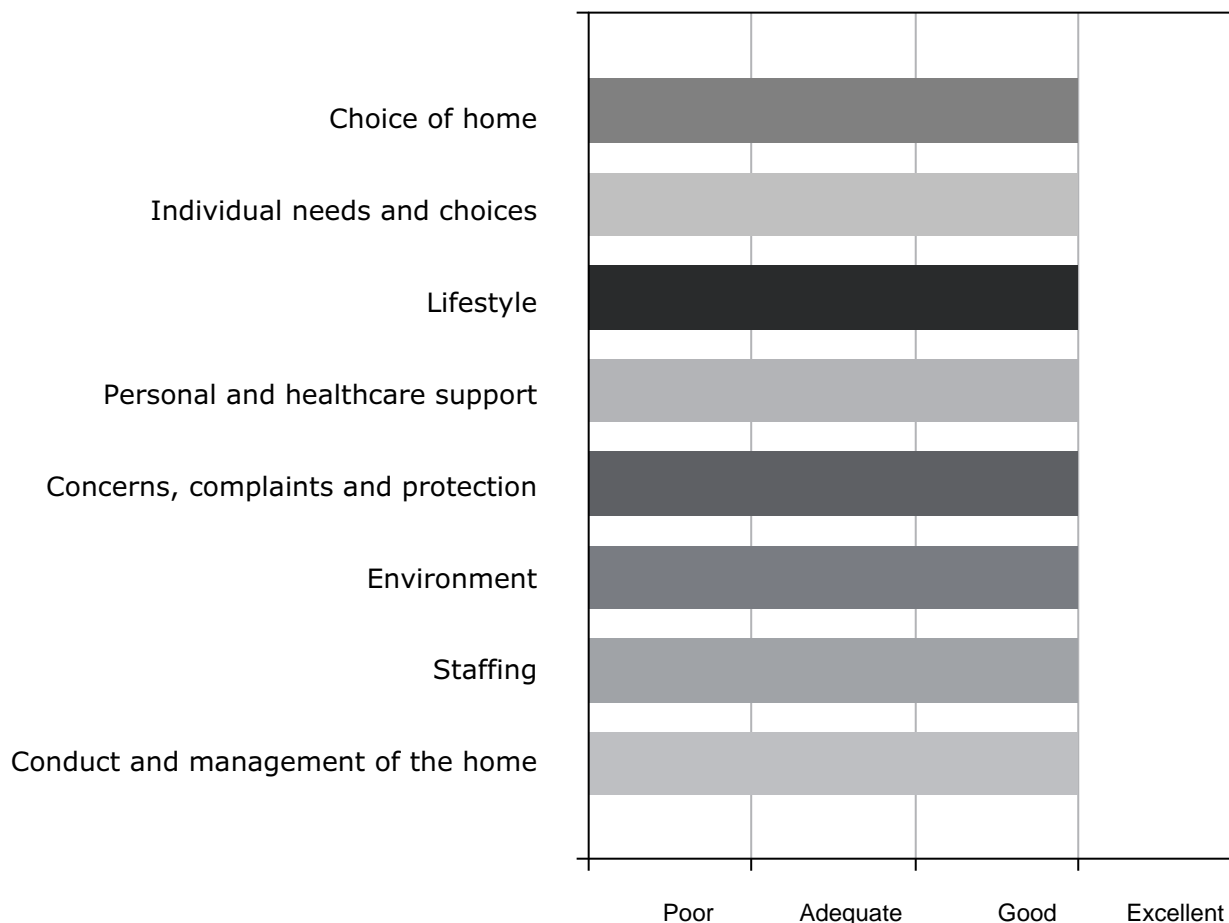

How we did our inspection:

No site visit has taken place as no-one has been living in the home since earlier this year.

As the home is not in use it is classed as a Dormant service. As such it will retain the same quality rating as at the last visit. The quality rating is 2 star good. Which means that if people lived there they would receive good quality outcomes.

The last site visit took place on 13th March 2008, and a report was subsequently produced. This report contains details of the environment and the policies and procedures in place. The environment is of a good standard and the policies and procedures cover the required areas.

It is not possible to measure the effectiveness of the home as nobody lives there.

As it remains the case that there is no-one accommodated at the home, an inspection visit has not been undertaken. The home will contact the CSCI if this position changes and an inspection will take place at that time to assess the service provided.
